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Introduction

The following information guide is meant to provide background and direction regarding the CCNM Preceptorship Program for both students and practitioners (preceptors).

The CCNM Preceptorship Program was designed to allow students to obtain valuable experience and mentorship at health care practices outside the institution. Preceptorship is a mandatory activity for all CCNM students and is conducted as part of the clinical education curriculum at CCNM. The specific requirements for student preceptorship over the course of the naturopathic program are briefly outlined in this document. Details of the requirements may be found:

Toronto Campus: myCCNM > Clinical Education > Preceptorship Information

Boucher Campus: e-Campus > Clinic > Preceptor Program.

The activity of precepting refers to students learning primarily by observation in the practice of a qualified health care provider. The primary goal of the preceptor program is to allow students to observe doctorpatient interactions in a clinical setting. Students are required to achieve specific numbers of preceptor hours and patient observations/contacts to complete the naturopathic program at CCNM and for CCNM to meet its accreditation standards.

Please note that students will not receive credit for activities or time that are not related to the observation of patient visits (for example, filing, marketing, reception work).

Purpose

A preceptorship is a one-to-one relationship between a health-care provider and a naturopathic student. The value of involving clinical preceptors in the teaching/learning process is that a one-to-one relationship is the most effective mechanism for clinical learning at this level of student clinical performance. Preceptorship allows for formative mentoring to take place in a time-limited relationship. It provides students with experiences in the real world of naturopathic and other health-care practices, bridging the gap between theory and practice.

Definitions:

A *preceptor* is a health-care provider of an external site that accepts a CCNM student for a preceptorship. A *preceptee* is a student attending a preceptor site. These are students in all stages of the CCNM naturopathic program.

Preceptoring hours refer to the amount of time spent observing patients and discussing patient cases. *Preceptoring contacts* refer to the number of individual patient contacts observed by preceptees.

Overview

Precepting is a required clinical education activity undertaken by all students at CCNM. To ensure that students do not overwhelm the limited number of preceptors in the community, precepting activity is integrated into and divided throughout the Clinical Education course stream over a student's time at CCNM.

The preceptorship requirements for students consist of both preceptoring hours and preceptoring patient contacts. Students require 100 preceptoring hours and 100 preceptoring patient contacts to graduate. Fifty (50%) of these clinical hours and patient contacts must be obtained with one or more registered naturopathic doctor(s). Obtaining this preceptorship experience is not restricted to specific points of the program; however, the program has linked preceptoring with specific clinical education courses to encourage more distributed learning over the entire program. The table below lists the required hours, required patient contacts, associated courses and period within which precepting should be performed. The preceptorship hours and contacts listed below are requirements of the individual Clinical Education courses specified. Proof of completion must be submitted by the published due dates for each course.



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<u>Toronto Campus</u> - Students are expected to keep records of their precepting activity on the Student Form for Preceptor Hours and Patient Contacts (aka Preceptor Tracking Form, located on Moodle, Student Resources> Forms and Resources. Records should be submitted to the office of Clinical Education.

<u>Boucher Campus</u> – Students are expected to submit the Preceptor Package, (available on eCampus>Clinic>Preceptor Program) to the Clinical Studies Coordinator.

Originals must be submitted, but it is strongly advised that students retain copies of all submitted forms.

* Students on a part-time schedule should refer to the specific courses for their unique timelines.

Preceptors should also keep a record of their role as a preceptor, as most regulatory Continuing Education programs recognize preceptorship as eligible for credit (please refer to the continuing education policies of individual professional regulatory boards).

For the Boucher campus, the Clinical Studies Coordinator keeps a record of all preceptoring hours completed and is available upon request.

Benefits to hosting a CCNM student for Preceptorship

By becoming an active participant in the CCNM preceptor program, you are joining a long tradition of teaching through example. Allowing students to observe you in practice, interact with your patients and learn from your expertise provides many benefits to both you and the student. Some of the attendant benefits are:

- Validates and reinforces professional values and practices
- Contributes to future health care by influencing a student's professional practices
- Provides an opportunity to teach & impart your clinical experience to future naturopathic doctors
- Provides exposure to potential future associates
- Stimulates practice innovations and improvement through exposure to innovative approaches in assessment and patient management taught at CCNM
- Involves you in the larger educational community and supports naturopathic education
- Provides Continuing Education credits for NDs
- You will be listed on CCNM's website as a preceptor
- It is enjoyable!

How precepting benefits the student

- Provides the opportunity to observe and participate in health care practices in a variety of settings
- Supports experience of the "real world" of naturopathic medical practice and allied health care
 practice
- Delivers valuable mentorship in being a medical practitioner
- Promotes mentoring in the naturopathic medical profession
- Encourages competence and confidence
- Allows for investigation of employment opportunities



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- Guides the transition from the role of student to independent practitioner
- Contributes to the formation of a professional identity

Preceptor Criteria

Students are encouraged to precept with a variety of relevant allied health-care providers. To be eligible as a preceptor, the health-care provider must be from a regulated profession (or transitioning to regulation) in the jurisdiction in which the student will be precepting and should have at least one year* of practice experience. The health-care practitioner must be engaging in regular, in-depth patient care (for example, pharmacist consultations would not qualify for preceptorship credits). Examples of eligible health-care providers (regulated or transitioning to regulation) include naturopathic doctor, medical doctor, osteopath, chiropractor, TCM practitioner, nurse, nurse practitioner, homeopath, etc. For a complete list of health-care providers regulated in the province of Ontario, please go to the Federation of Health Regulatory Colleges of Ontario website:

(http://www.health.gov.on.ca/en/pro/programs/hhrsd/about/regulated_professions.aspx). CCNM reserves the right to reject health-care provider categories that do not align with the goals of the preceptorship program.

* The College of Naturopathic Physicians of British Columbia will not allow a Naturopathic Physician to preceptor if they have not been in practice in BC (British Columbia), for a minimum of five (5) years.

Student must engage in preceptorship with at least three different individual health-care providers, but they need not be from different professions. However, of the 100 preceptoring hours and contacts required, a minimum of 50 hours and 50 patient contacts are required with a Naturopathic Doctor. Preceptoring with a naturopathic doctor may occur at any time over the length of the program of study.

Preceptor Registration

Be a part of the CCNM Preceptorship Program.

Being a preceptor brings rewards to you and to the students you host. The CCNM Preceptorship Program was developed to recognize and appreciate the time and effort practitioners put into hosting students from CCNM. Practitioners who participate in the CCNM Preceptorship Program will receive written recognition for their commitment. In addition, your regulatory college will accept preceptorship as Continuing Education credits. (For example, in Ontario, preceptor hosts will receive 1 Category B credit per day, up to a maximum of 15 credits. Consult your regional regulator for details)

To participate, please indicate on the preceptor registration form that you are interested in joining the CCNM Preceptorship Program.

<u>Toronto campus</u>, we ask that you commit to hosting students in your practice for at least 30 hours per year (counted from the time of registration). At the end of your year, please submit you Preceptor Log to the Office of Clinical Education (contact information is on the form).

<u>Boucher Campus</u> you may preceptor as many hours as you are able to contribute. At the conclusion of your preceptorship with a student, you are required to evaluate the student using the Preceptor Host Evaluation of Student form (supplied by the student) and email a copy directly to the Clinical Studies Coordinator.

Eligible health-care practitioners who have not yet been in the role of CCNM preceptor must register prior to hosting student preceptees. The preceptor should complete the CCNM Preceptor Registration Form



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and return it to the Office of Clinical Education in Toronto and the Clinical Studies Coordinator at Boucher, prior to any arranged preceptorship dates.

CCNM students wishing to engage in precepting with a particular health-care provider should forward this Preceptor Program Information document to the host practitioner and ensure the Preceptor Registration Form is submitted to the Office of Clinical Education in Toronto, and the Clinical Studies Coordinator at Boucher, prior to engaging in preceptorship activity. Students will only be contacted if the preceptor is not eligible to host. Students engaging in preceptorship prior to host approval may not be credited for preceptorship activity performed. Preceptor eligibility will be determined by the Office of Clinical Education and/or the Associate Dean, Clinical Education.

Please consider adding yourself to the CCNM Preceptorship Program List of Practitioners. You will be doing a great service to the students of CCNM and to your profession.

Roles and Responsibilities of the Preceptor and Preceptee

The relationship between the preceptor and student is essential to provide the best possible clinical learning for the student. To be successful, these relationships must be grounded in mutual trust and respect, clear expectations, and open communication.

The preceptor's first responsibility is to his/her clients, and then to students. Students are responsible for their own learning and actions. Some basic teaching techniques may be employed to facilitating this process.

Role of the Preceptor:

- Allow the student an opportunity to observe the preceptor in the clinical environment demonstrating skills in patient interviewing, physical exam, therapeutic management, and the utilization of medical literature.
- May not be a family member.
- Provide a supportive learning environment.
- Exemplify a high standard of health care practice standards.
- Provide constructive feedback to the student.
- Model a reflective practice style that stresses the concept of life-long learning.
- Report any issues to the Office of Clinical Education.

Please do not ask the student preceptee to engage in office management, marketing, or other administrative tasks. While these are important practice management skills, the objective of preceptorship is to provide clinical care experience for our students. They will be provided credit for clinical observation hours and patient observations only.

Students are permitted to be a preceptee at their workplace but may not be working while engaging in preceptorship.

In addition to role-modeling how you keep up on new practice-applicable developments, it is appropriate for students to enhance their skills in searching the medical literature, with support and to their level of knowledge. This is also a wonderful way for you to keep learning and to provide up-to-date care for your patients.

What to expect as a Preceptor

- 1. Students will contact your office to formally request a precepting opportunity. They should specify the year of the program they are in.
- 2. If you accept the student, it is useful to clarify your expectations and to notify them of when they should arrive at the clinic



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- 3. Students must arrive before the clinic session to review the upcoming patients and be alerted to learning opportunities.
- 4. Orient the student to the clinical site. Initially, you should orient the student to the office and introduce them to your staff, discuss the nature of your practice, your approach to care, and review your expectations.
- 5. Outline, with the student, parameters of responsibility for patient workup, recording, feedback, and disposition.
- 6. Students have different abilities in different years of the program. Confirm what year your student is in so that you can better prepare for their visit (see Student Skills by Year of Program)
- 7. At the end of the preceptorship, fill out and sign the student's preceptorship form. Keep a record of student time in your practice in the Preceptor Log proof to claim Continuing Education credits for the Toronto campus. The Clinical Studies Coordinator on the Boucher campus will record all preceptor hours and that information is available upon request.
- 8. Communicate immediately with the Associate Dean of Clinical Education at the appropriate campus regarding a student whose performance is unprofessional or unsafe, or whenever there are any concerns about student's behaviours.

Students Skills by Year of Program

* Please note that preceptorship hosts are asked to allow students to observe patient care. Participation is optional in Ontario for 3rd and 4th year interns. Any participation must be under the direct supervision of the preceptor and may not include gynecological examinations, prostate examinations, low-amplified thrust manipulation, acupuncture, venipuncture, or parenteral therapy. Provision of care or communication of diagnosis is prohibited.



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Students wishing to engage more fully in patient care are recommended to apply for a CCNM Externship and will require additional liability insurance coverage. The Externship Program is only open to 4th year clinical interns.

Role of the Preceptee:

Students should appreciate that preceptors are volunteering time out of their busy practices to help students experience and learn about health care in a practical setting. Students are expected to always exhibit exemplary personal and professional conduct and behaviour as a representative of the Canadian College of Naturopathic Medicine. The role of a student includes the following:

- Observe the clinical interactions presented to you.
- Respect the conditions of the preceptor.
- Adhere strictly to privacy regulations.
- Ask questions of your preceptor at appropriate times and with respect.
- Receive feedback in the spirit with which it is intended: as a learning lesson.
- Reflect upon your observations and the feedback provided to you.
- Attend to any academic or clinical assignments related to preceptorship.
- Exemplify professionalism as would befit a practicing naturopathic doctor.

Students are permitted to be a preceptee at their workplace but may not be working while engaging in preceptorship.

Responsibilities of the Preceptee

- 1. Contact the preceptor to book a date and time for the preceptorship.
- 2. Submit the Preceptor Registration From, if necessary, to the Office of Clinical Education in Toronto and to the Clinical Studies Coordinator in Boucher at least 5 business days prior to precepting.
- 3. Confirm with the preceptor how you should prepare for the visit (including dress).
- 4. Contact the preceptor if you are unable to be at the clinical site as scheduled, preferably in time for the site to make alternative arrangements, if necessary.
- 5. Identify and share your learning needs and clinical experience objectives with the preceptor.
- 6. Submit relevant preceptorship records to the Office of Clinical Education for the Toronto Campus and the Clinical Studies Coordinator for the Boucher Campus, according to course due dates (refer to relevant course outline).
- 7. Ensure the preceptor is not a family member and work collaboratively
- 8. Boucher campus only submit the Preceptor Package to the Clinical Studies Coordinator.
- 9. Acknowledge contributions of site and preceptor to your learning.

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Appendix A: Recommendation on Informed Consent

It is recommended that patients observed by the student provide consent for the interaction and acknowledgement that they are aware that a visiting student may engage in discussion of the patient case or perform certain portions of the intake (Ontario), under the supervision of the preceptorship host.

- The patient should be made aware that the person interacting with the patient is a student at CCNM, fulfilling requirements for clinical training.
- The provisions for consent must be in concordance with the Ontario Health Care Consent Act or equivalent in the jurisdiction of the practice.

The consent below may serve as a template for the Preceptorship Host:
